## O Say Can You See?

Two years ago, the Rotary Club of Allentown generously gave St. Luke's Allentown a grant to begin a Remedial Vision Program at Raub Middle School. Since then more than 400 students received eye exams and glasses they needed to read, see the blackboard, and succeed in school.

Our diligence and hard work continues to pay off, as St. Luke's was contacted by The Gift of Sight Van and offered the amazing opportunity to receive a week of free eye exams and glasses to any student in need in the Lehigh Valley. The van is coming to Freedom High School from October 20-24 from 8:15 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. loaded with glasses and frames.



Our goal is to help The Gift of Sight Van provide glasses to 1,000 students within the Lehigh Valley, including more than 300 from the Allentown School

District. The amazing thing is that each student will get an eye exam, prescription, and glasses on the same day, all completely free of charge.

We're just about ready to go, but we need your help. We need five volunteers each day to take students from the waiting area to their exams, and to the fitting area (all on the Freedom High School campus).

While we need people all the time, the times we are in most need are Wednesday afternoon, Thursday all day, and Friday morning.

September 5 – Marci Moyer Schick, a former member of the Liberty Bell Club, has belonged to our club for the past two years. Marci is the Vice President of Institutional Advancement for Phoebe Ministries in Allentown.

Marci has taken up distance running in recent years both as an avocation and fitness program. Thanks to the encouragement of Wendy Body, Marci has now built up her conditioning to compete in 5K and Half Marathon competitions. Marci is truly a woman on a mission!

Growing up in Allentown, Marci's parents owned Noel's Café that was just across the street from our meeting place on Ninth Street. There she recalled

working at just about every job from bus boy to waitress and along the way learned how to talk with people and interact with workers in the many downtown businesses who were regular customers at Noel's.

Now as a professional fund-raiser, Marci continues her mission of service to people. She has worked for Muhlenberg College and Miller Memorial Blood Center. She belongs to the local chapter of the Association of Fund-Raising Professionals, where she has earned certification. In each of her professional roles, Marci has found motivation from connecting people who desire to give with causes that matter in our community.

Marci recounted the story of a special experience at Phoebe that drives her passion for philanthropy. A potential donor had challenged her to find individuals with special needs and no other sources for support.

Marci identified a resident of Phoebe Home who could not afford a motorized wheelchair. With the staff's support, this opportunity turned into a major gift. The resident not only received his wheelchair,

but in time rediscovered his passion for painting. After setting up an impromptu studio at Phoebe, this resident befriended another resident who also painted. The two became fast friends as they shared the studio space to enjoy their artwork. This is the heart of generosity that Marci works to discover in her work.

## American On Wheels Museum

September 26 – Today's meeting was held at America On Wheels, the new transportation museum on Front Street in Allentown. Rotary member David Bausch introduced the AOW Executive Director, Linda Merkel, who stated that the not-for-profit museum celebrates the history of over-the-road transportation and highlights future means of moving people and product.

The very large building which houses the museum is 4,300 square feet. It is comprised of two floors with 2,600 square feet of exhibit space which can accommodate up to 75 vehicles. Almost all of the vehicles in the exhibits are on loan. The gallery exhibits are theme oriented such as a history of police cars or the cars of the British Invasion. Additionally, the exhibits are changed every six months to

provide interest and encourage return tours.

The museum offers something for everyone to enjoy including educational programs. Approved by the Department of Education in Harrisburg, America On Wheels just completed a seven week summer pilot educational program with 50 children. America On Wheels is currently working with the Smithsonian Institute to join their network of museums.

Following the brief, but informative introduction to the museum by Ms. Merkel, Rotary members strolled through the museum exhibits to complete the meeting hour.
